After nine years, New Prague High School's robotics team continues to provide students interested in robotics a chance to work in a team setting toward a goal as they learn and adapt to adjust on the fly in a competitive setting.

Robotics is aimed at creating a device which is built from the ground up to accomplish a specific task in a competition. The rules of the competition and game are released after the Christmas holiday break. Working in groups, students focus their efforts on the specific elements of the robot they'll build. Some will work on programming, others will prepare the apparatus needed to prepare for competition. Another group works on promoting the robotics team throughout the

The team traveled to Cedar Falls, Iowa, in late-April for a regional competition. The New Prague Robotics team finished 35th in a field of 52 teams. It struggled with technical difficulties and the impact of an inadvertent collision with another robot during a preliminary round of competition.

In addition to its work preparing for the next competition, the group is also working on outreach to the next generation of robotics students. The team promotes the program in the district's elementary schools and also offers presentations at community festivals, like the Scott County Fair and Dozinky, New Prague's Czech harvest festival.


Speech

National Honor Society

There are 81 juniors and seniors in the New Prague High School chapter of National Honor Society. Of the 81, 44 are seniors. They filled out an application at the start of their junior or senior year. A committee decides whether the student will be accepted into the chapter, said Matt Stensrud, a language arts teacher who is also the NHS advisor. The criteria for acceptance are the four tenants of NHS – scholarship, leadership, character and service. Students must have a minimum GPA of 3.40

About 70 percent of the applicants are accepted into NHS, Stensrud said.

The primary reason applications are declined are a lack of volunteer service hours or a lack of leadership opportunities. "Many of these students, when they're applying at the end

portunities," Stensrud said.

The students in NHS are expected to commit to completing 30 hours of volunteer service in a school year. That can be a challenge for some NHS students, many who are involved in athletics or other school-related activities, Stensrud said. Meeting the commitment to 30 hours is a sign of a student's character. The local chapter's leaders established the Peace Center food shelf as the primary benefactor of fundraising

"These kids are already in a lot of things and they still find value in giving back to the community," Stensrud said.

The group's officers select an organization or cause to support at the beginning of the school year. In the past two years, NHS students have raised over about \$8,000 for Peace Cen-

"Last year, we raised \$4,050 and the year before it was about the same," Stensrud said. "The last two years have been

Their main fundraisers are a poinsettia sale and a tent city project to raise awareness of homelessness. The students also collect coats and food donations for Peace Center at Hallow-

The group has found local organizations are a more attractive source of funds than out-of-town groups, Stensrud said. National Honor Society students also donate their time for other initiatives. NHS members serve as bell-ringers for the Salvation Army Red Kettle fundraiser before the holidays. The students also help run an elementary book fair, a Halloween party, an ag fair and a highway cleanup. They also maintain a park cleanup effort at Heritage Park in New Prague.

"These kids are just like all the other kids. A lot of them work really hard academically. A lot of them take upper-level classes," Stensrud said.




GSA Club
